Year 11: The “new” Year 12, are having their first experiences of the demands and requirements that the Year 12 of 2016 have just been through. With a range of assessments being due or done over the last weeks of this term, the rigours of a HSC are now becoming apparent and students are reminded that there is little flexibility on meeting time schedules. 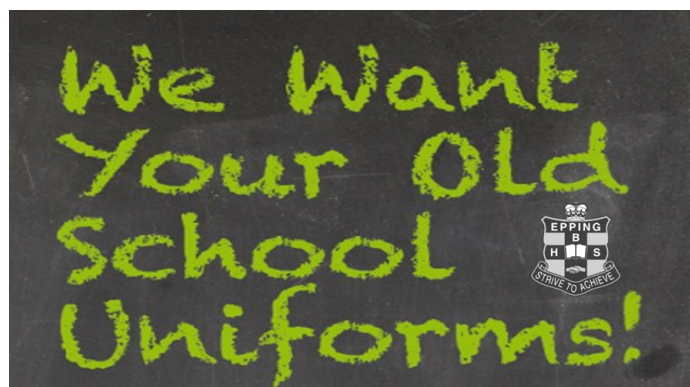

STRIVE TO ACHIEVE

Another year has come and gone and we finally arrive at the last newsletter with the mammoth task of summing up the many achievements for 2016. This year I will focus on a few areas where improvements have been made in the Middle School.

During 2016 we have worked hard to build meaningful connections with our partner primary schools. We have grown our partnership with Epping North Public School, improved communication and sharing of information with primary schools and further refined that transition process for student moving from Year 6 to Year 7. A number of notable successes were:

- A sharing morning where teachers from Epping Boys High School met with teachers from Epping North Public School to look at common themes between each other's school plan to share approaches and look for ways to work together. A number of partnerships came out of this meeting such as a mentoring program where students from Epping Boys High School who participated in the schools mentoring program, Boys To Men, worked with Year 4 students to look at bullying and its causes and make short films to express this understanding.
- The continuing of the game design day where students in Year 9 Information Software and Technology taught game design to students in Year 4.
- A band mentoring program that kicked off in Term 4 where students from Epping Boys High School and Cheltenham Girls High School visit Epping North Public School to mentor students in band.
- A meeting with partner primary schools in Term 1 to collaboratively look at ways of improving transition to high school resulted in the development of a scaffold where better information was shared about students' needs and what they had learned in primary school to improve the continuity of learning from primary school to high school.
- The reintroduction of a sharing afternoon with High Schools and Primary Schools in the areas meeting to share information to improve transition to high school.
- A reading program was established with Eastwood Heights Public School.

To all the families connected with Epping Boys High School, I wish you a safe and relaxing break with your families.

The workshops catered for students of all ability levels - giving a large range of students the opportunity of learning new skills and enhancing their ability to solve problems.

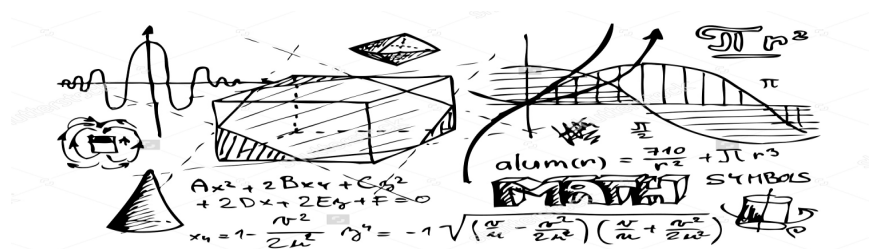
Students worked at their own pace and competed at their own ability level. The incursion catered to all levels from standard to advanced. Photographed are our mathematics genius winners. Well Done!

This year's Crossroads Program was held from the 28-30 November and was very successful in improving the skills and knowledge of the Year 10 students who participated in the program. They thoroughly enjoyed themselves and were very well behaved.

This year, students in Year 10 were prepared and supported to lead, and contribute to, healthy, safe and meaningful lives which promote respect, responsibility, enjoyment, inclusion and social justice for self and others.

Students were exposed to six learning contexts over the three days, which were presented in different sessions, on the following topics:

- ◆ Personal identity
- ◆ Mental health and wellbeing
- ◆ Relationships
- ◆ Sexuality and sexual health
- ◆ Drugs and alcohol
- ◆ Safe travel

Some students were also fortunate to be invited to attend Macquarie University as part of the program, along with Mrs Ramsay for a Discovery Day, where they had the opportunity to take part in a variety of workshops including workshops on Law, Medicine and Science.

Teaching and learning fun

Year seven has been busy completing all sorts of exciting and practical tasks. All year classes just submitted their travel diaries for the Global Environments topic. Students had the opportunity to use their knowledge of the environments they have studied to imaginative diary, as if they were traveling through the environment. A few recaps of the learning have been included below.

"Wow! We actually received an assignment that was fun! I don't think I would've ever said that beforehand. learning about the different environments on earth and then putting your chosen one into a travel diary wasn't too bad and it turned out to be an enjoyable project.

Firstly, we had to research about the different environments on earth and then we had to choose the environment that we thought would make a good travel diary. We then had to pretend that we were an explorer in that environment and jot down what we observed over five days in the chosen environment.

To complete the diary, we first had to show where our environment could be found. Here, we had to provide a world map and a hand-drawn regional map that included BOLTS. This was useful as we learnt how to complete a proper map.

Next was the description of the physical environment. For this we used Google Earth to help us identify the formation of the land. We then had to include the average climate, rainfall and the best time to travel. After that, we hand-drew one type of flora and one type of fauna found in that environment and describe any adaptations it developed. I thought that drawing the flora and fauna was quite fun. By drawing species, we learnt about their adaptations and features.

After this, we had to describe the process that made up the environment. Any atmospheric, hydrological, biotic and geomorphic processes were included. I learnt a lot from this. Some of the processes I knew about and it was good to learn about some of the processes that make up the environments.

The final section was on the human environment and how people have impacted the environment. I loved this assignment and would happily do a similar assignment again. I thought I gained a lot of new knowledge and I'm sure from what others have said, that they would happily do something like this again."

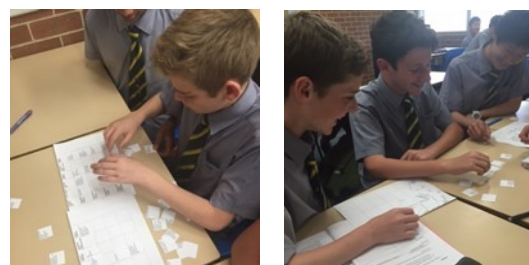

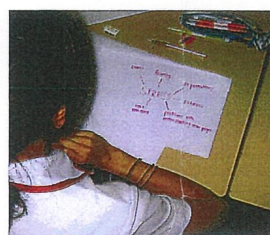
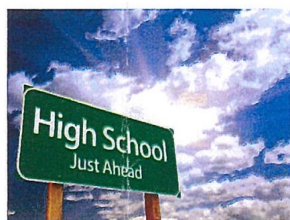
